
CHAPTER 7 / Analyzing a Picture

Illustrations are visual documents that can provide useful information about the era in which they were created and the artist's point of view. Below is an illustration by William M. Cary, created two weeks after the famous Battle of the Little Bighorn. Look carefully at the illustration, and then, on a separate piece of paper, answer the questions below using the image and information from the text.

- (1) What is the title of the illustration? What year was it created? The battle on the Little Big Horn River.
- (2) What is the illustration about? this illustration is about the amount of deaths in the war
- (3) Find Lieutenant Colonel George Armstrong Custer's location in the illustration. Why do you think Cary placed him there? they wanted to show that he was the one in charge.
- (4) After studying the illustration, what conclusions can you draw about the artist's point of view? he was in war
